7 The first steel mill in America began operating in this town in 1728 (Hartford County) (8)

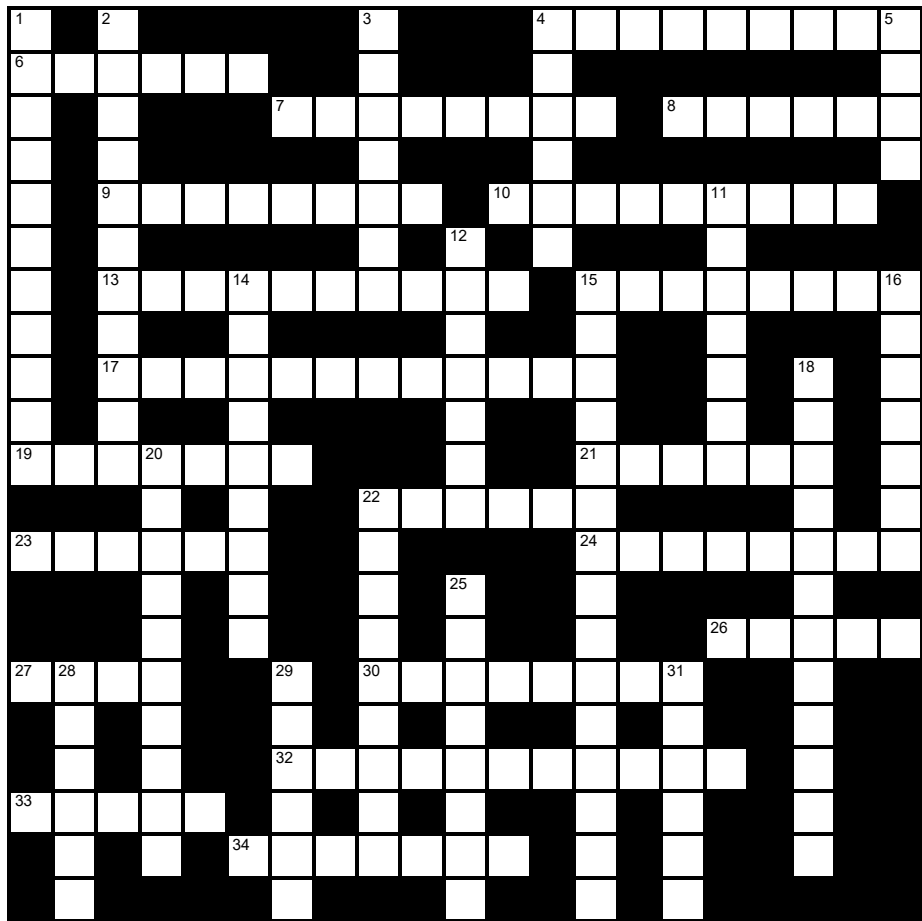
8 Home of The Coley Homestead (Fairfield County) (6)

- 5 Bull's Bridge, a single-lane vehicular wooden covered bridge, crosses the Housatonic River in this town (Litchfield County) (4)
- 11 Birthplace of "Flying Governor" John H. Trumbull (Windham County) (7)
- 12 Location of Eastern Connecticut State University (Windham County) (7)
- 16 Originally known as Quanneapague (Fairfield County) (7)
- 18 Hometown of the 1965 Little League World Series winning team (Hartford County) (7,5)
- 20 The "Grand Central Station" of the Underground Railroad in Connecticut (Hartford County) (10)
- 22 Home to the highest point in Connecticut (Litchfield County) (9)
